



Founded in 1933 as the Cannery Workers and Farm Laborers Union, Local 18257 of the American Federation of Labor (AFL), it represented Alaska salmon cannery workers and farm workers. In 1937, the union became Cannery Workers and Farm Laborers Union, Local 7 of the United Cannery, Agricultural, Packing, and Allied Workers of America of the Congress of Industrial Organziations (CIO). In 1945, Local 7 became affiliated with the Food, Tobacco, and Agricultural Workers of America (CIO). In 1951 the union became Local 37 of International Longshoremen's and Warehousemen's Union, and ca. 1987 it became Region 37 of IBU/ILWU. The membership historically was Filipino American cannery workers.

The Cannery Workers' and Farm Laborers' Union was organized June 19, 1933 in Seattle to represent the primarily Filipino-American laborers who worked in the Alaska salmon canneries. Filipino Alaskeros first appeared in the canneries around 1911. In the 1920s as exclusionary immigration laws went into effect, they replaced the Japanese, who had replaced the Chinese in the canneries. Workers were recruited through labor contractors who were paid to provide a work crew for the summer canning season. The contractor paid workers wages and other expenses. This system led to many abuses and harsh working conditions from which grew the movement toward unionization.

The CWFLU, under the leadership of its first President, Virgil Duyungan, was chartered as Local 19257 by the American Federation of Labor in 1933. On December 1, 1936 an agent of a labor contractor murdered Duyungan and Secretary Aurelio Simon. Despite this setback, the union was able to win a hiring hall and end the contract labor system in 1937. After Duyungan's death, Conrad Espe, A Norwegian-American labor organizer, took the leading role in the union. Under the leadership of Duyungan and Espe, the CWFLU made numerous attempts to organize farm workers during the winter months. Farm Division organizers attempted to organize workers in Yakima, Kent, Everett, Bainbridge Island and the White River area, but were often met with harsh opposition from local officials and vigilantes.

Local 18257 came into conflict with the AFL, in 1937 when the parent body, attempting to separate the union along racial lines, recognized a Japanese local organized by Clarence Arai. Local 18257 successfully retained negotiation rights and dispatched its workers in 1937 despite pickets set up by the rival group. Bitterness toward the AFL resulted from the incidents and led to a November 4 vote by the Seattle, Portland, and San Francisco locals to affiliate with the newly formed United Cannery, Agricultural, Packinghouse and Allied Workers of America-CIO (UCAPAWA). 

The United States took possession of the Philippines in 1898 and in the decades after that, Filipinos, mostly men, began to make their way to America to seek employment, especially in the fields and canneries. In 1933 some of these men formed the first Filipino-led union ever organized in the United States: the Cannery Workers' and Farm Labors' Union Local 18257. Based in Seattle, it was organized by "Alaskeros" who worked in the Alaska salmon canneries each summer and in the harvest fields of Washington, Oregon, and California in the other seasons. The union was in its shaky beginnings when two of its founders were murdered. Yet, although its leaders were dead, the union would not die. Instead in the next few years, it grew stronger, becoming effective up and down the West Coast.

This paper investigates the early history of the Cannery Workers' and Farm Laborers' Union and the sense of pride and fraternity within the Alaskero brotherhood that made the union possible. Much of the credit has to be given to the Filipino community. The workers believed in community and unity. The Cannery Workers' and Farmers' Union's



- Maintained in Wikidata

# Wikidata Property Proposals

- Archives West is an online aggregator of over 40,000 finding aids for collections in 48 repositories in 6 western U.S. states
- Two property proposals were made for this project:
  - Archives West finding aid ID (P9335)
  - Archives West repository ID (P11366)
- All finding aids have the URL <u>https://archiveswest.orbiscascade.org/ark:80444/</u> followed by a unique identifier. This stable pattern enables the Archives West finding aid property.
- Archives West repository ID enables retrieval of all finding aids for a particular repository from the Wikidata item for that repository



#### Historical Note -



The Amalgamated Meat Cutters and Butcher Workmen of North America (AMC & BW of NA), a labor union representing retail butchers and packinghouse workers, was chartered by the American Federation of Labor (AFL) in 1897, consolidating seven local unions in Chicago. The AMC & BW of NA was committed to craft unionism, with 56 departments representing various workers in the meat industry. Workers in each craft within a city had their own council, executive board, business agent and contract. In early 1900, nine Seattle butchers formed the Protective Union of Butchers, Local 81. This local was the first butcher trade union in Washington State, and would officially be chartered Local 81 of the Amalgamated Meat Cutters and Butcher Workers in Orth America on April 2, 1900.

- By hand, do more granular identity management in NACO and Wikidata as time allows (still in progress)



# **OpenRefine Wikidata Extension**

- Preview changes
- Use Wikidata extension to "Upload edits to Wikibase"
- Once items were created, we created a new column from the reconciled Label column with all the new Qids to facilitate links back to Wikidata from the finding aids and MARC records



## Wikidata Links

## **MARC 21**

- Use MARCEdit's OCLC API integration to open MARC 21 records
- Convert to MARC XML
- Take records out of MARC 21 and process using XSLT written by Theo Gerontakos, along with table with Wikidata Qids
- Convert output to .mrc
- Copy and paste output into MARCEdit, replacing initially imported records
- Push changes via OCLC API

• Use Python script to insert Wikidata links into copies of finding aids created by Special Collections staff

# Challenges

## **MARC 21 Data**

- Collections had fallen through the cracks over years of changes to semiautomated cataloging workflows
- Changes to finding aids (as with new accessions) had not carried over to MARC records
- No inventory numbers
- Missing or incorrect Archives West URIs

## **EAD Finding Aid Data**

• Changes in MARC descriptions (correcting typos, for instance) had not carried over to finding aids

## Wikidata & OpenRefine:

- Removing or changing statements in bulk when application profile decisions change
- OpenRefine reconciliation can be a slow business
- Data cleaning processes in OpenRefine could use further automation

# **Future Work**

## • MARC 21 pre-processing guidance and tools

- Putting dates in 046 fields
- Including inventory numbers in a consistent place
- Repairing links
- Further integration of MARC 21 and archival finding aid workflows
- Add items for LAW oral histories from Internet Archive
- Extend pilot to larger archival collections at UW
- Automate selected tasks as possible
